Abkhazi Garden Finances 2024



TLC Executive Director, Dianna Stenberg shared both Abkhazi Garden's Income and Expenses from Oct 1, 2023 to Sep 30, 2024 with the Abkhazi Advisory Board in October. The bottom line, we are in the black this year.

- 2024- \$34,083.89 (Estate of David Weismiller \$20,000) 2023- \$14,269.67.(Oak Tree Expenses)
- 2022 \$67,039.35 (Estate Joan Alston Stewart \$40,000)
- 2021 \$6,445.27 (Fence and Oak Tree expenses)
- 2020 -\$17,988.59 (Covid fewer visitors)

Please note these figures do not include TLC staff and overhead expenses.

The Income and Expense term from Oct 1, 2023 to Sep 30, 2024 will be moving to May1, 2024 to April 30,2025 to coordinate with TLC's fiscal term.

Our goal is to continue to increase gate donations, the endowment fund and fund-raising events to the point the garden becomes revenue neutral.

TLC Fundraising for Walkway in Fall Appeal



This year TLC is aiming to raise \$39,000 to match a grant to fund the transformation of the existing uneven Abkhazi Garden driveway into a new permeable walkway that is accessible, walkable, bikeable, and drivable. The new walkway will meet environmental standards and be aesthetically pleasing.

Our project will involve re-grading the driveway to reduce and smooth out the slope. Then a grid will be installed and filled with gravel. Both sides of this permeable gravel section will have a 3-foot paver border to make walking up to the teahouse and into the garden easier and safer, especially for mobility challenged guests.
